The November branch meeting will be held on Saturday, November 16 at 10:30 a.m. at the River Falls Library Community Room. The program will feature a panel discussion of Sheryl Sandberg's recent and controversial book *Lean In: Women and the Will to Lead*. The book probes business leadership and the dearth of women in leadership positions in government and business even with the gains of "Women's Movement." Sandberg is the Chief Operating Officer of Facebook and former Vice President for Google.

Discussing the ideas presented in this book will be three area women: Connie Foster, Betty Wetherell-Gustafson and Susan Lee, all of whom have had first-hand experiences in the corporate and academic world. The discussion will be moderated by Elaine Baumann, AAUW member and former high school principal.

Connie Foster has been the Interim Chancellor at UW-RF having served as Interim Provost and Vice-Chancellor Dean of College of Education and Professional Studies, and Chair of the Department of Health and Human Performance.

Betty Wetherell-Gustafson is Inside Account Director at Thomson Reuters, a multinational media and information firm. She is a graduate of Hamline University and William Mitchell College of Law.

Susan Lee is a Programmer Analyst at Datacard Group having previously worked in analysis, design, and implementation. She is a graduate of the University of St. Thomas.

Steiner has written a book **"How To Survive: The Extraordinary Resilience of Ordinary People,"** which will be published next year.

Malala Yousafzai Wins EU Human-Rights Prize

European lawmakers announced Thursday that they've given Europe's top human-rights prize to Malala Yousafzai, the Pakistani schoolgirl who was catapulted to global fame after surviving a Taliban assassination attempt last year. The Sakharov Prize comes with \$65,000 and was previously awarded to Nelson Mandela and Aung San Suu Kyi.



Malala Yousafzai, had a meeting with President Obama and his wife Michelle and older daughter Malia in the White House. The White House issued a press release and a photo,

saying that the presidential couple had invited this youngest ever Nobel Peace Prize nominee to visit "to thank her for her inspiring and passionate work on behalf of girls' education in Pakistan."

International Conference Action to Achieve Commitments in UNGA Resolution 67/146: Intensifying Global Efforts for the Elimination of Female Genital Mutilations

Press Statement, Moving Forward Statement -- High Level Segment, Rome, Italy, October 22, 2013

Hosted by the Government of Italy, the Conference brought together representatives from over 25 governments, as well as civil society organizations, parliamentarians, human rights defenders, regional intergovernmental institutions and United Nations agencies.

Governments agreed to a groundbreaking, comprehensive commitment to eliminate female genital mutilations, recognizing that policies, programs and services must be part of a holistic, culturally sensitive approach that promotes, protects and fulfills the rights of girls and women.

Women of the World Call for Urgent Action on Climate Change From Nation of Change, October28, 2013

Alison Rose Levy, News Report: Last month, the International Women's Earth and Climate Summit took place in Suffern, NY, with 100 women delegates, top-level policymakers, grassroots organizers and indigenous chiefs from around the world. From the heart of the Amazon Rainforest, to the forests of the Congo, to the foothills of Himalayas, organizers and indigenous tribal leaders from Africa, Asia, Latin America, Europe and North America assembled, speaking different languages, wearing different garbs, embedded in different cultures, but all devoted to the health of the Earth and future generations.
