Believe it or not, Saudi Arabia was just elected to the U.N. women's rights commission By Amanda Erickson, World Views, 5/3/2017

Saudi Arabia was approved as a member of the United Nations Commission on the Status of Women for a four-year term, starting in 2018. Twelve other nations were also selected. Membership is determined by the 54 nations in the U.N. Economic and Social Council. Generally, a vote is not called and countries are approved unanimously.

The United Nations defended the decision, saying in a statement that it works with all member states to advance gender equality and female empowerment. Saudi Arabia's interest in occupying one of the Commission's seats allocated to the Asia-Pacific region is an indication that the country wants to play an active role in the work of this important body.

Macron Pulls 'a Trudeau' and Fills Half his Cabinet with Women, By Jenavieve Hatch, World Post

Recently elected French President Emmanuel Macron has delivered on his promise to take gender equality seriously.

Macron announced that among the members of his 22-person cabinet, 11 of them are women. From his list of 577 new lawmakers' names as candidates for France's upcoming parliamentary elections, 223 of them were women.

Japan's Princess Mako to Give up Royalty for True Love, News Real Clear Life Staff

Plans are underway for Princess Mako to become engaged to commoner Kei Komuru, a law firm worker and graduate student, Komuru and the princess, both 25, met five years ago when they were students at the International Christian University in Tokyo. The engagement won't be official until there's a ceremonial exchange of gifts, but the news has sparked fresh concerns about the shrinking size of the imperial family. It currently has 19 members; only three of whom can ascend to the throne: Crown Prince Naruhito, his younger brother Crown Prince Akishino, and Akishino's son, Prince Hisahito.

Sofia Coppola Wins Best Director at Cannes, Becoming Only the Second Woman to do so

Coppola won the Best Director award for *The Beguiled*: she is only the second female director in the festival's 70-year history to win the award. The last time that happened, the award went to Soviet director Yuliya Solntseva for her World War II film *The Story of the Flaming Years*—in 1961. Coppola also has the distinction of being the first woman to win Best Director who attended the festival as a child the year her father's film won the Palme d'Or.

Women Just Made History at the UK Election, 06/09/2017

U.K. Women are enjoying a historic moment in British politics. Voters in the United Kingdom elected a record number of female politicians to office than ever before, but equality in Parliament is still some way off.

Women now represent just over 30 percent of the U.K.'s 650 constituencies.

History made with First Woman to captain Queen's guard, The Telegraph, by Hannah Furness, Royal Correspondent

When Captain Megan Couto calls out her oh-so-familiar drill commands, she will make history. The 24 years old, five foot two-and-a half tall, will become the first woman to command the Queen's Guard in its 180 years at Buckingham Palace.

Captain Couto, who serves with the Second Battalion, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry (2PPCLI), will be the face of equality in the armed forces: taking on responsibility for the ceremonial Changing of the Guards before any British woman has even been allowed into the infantry.

Israel Freezes Plan for Mixed-Gender Prayer Space at Western Wall, 6/25/2017, by Jeffrey Heller; Editing by Gareth Jones, Reuters

JERUSALEM, - Israel's government formally suspended plans for a mixed-gender prayer space at Jerusalem's Western Wall, bowing to opposition from Orthodox Jewish politicians to reforms at one of Judaism's holiest sites. The wall is officially administered by an ultra-Orthodox rabbi.

All-Girl Robotics Team in Afghanistan Risked Death to Compete in U.S., but were initially denied one-week travel visas to the U.S. WORLD NEWS, 07/01/2017, By Sebastian Murdock

A group of six teenage Afghan girls with a passion for science trekked 500 miles from their home of Herat to the violence plagued capital city of Kabul all with the hope of competing in the U.S.

The girls had hoped to take their robot to the *FIRST Global Challenge*, an international robotics competition happening in Washington, D.C. Initially, their visa request was rejected as President Donald Trump continues his crack down on travel from other Muslim-majority countries to the United States

However, after a backlash, the U.S. State Department allowed entry to the all-girl Robotics Team, and the robot the teens created will get to compete in D.C.

Jordan abolishes 'marry the rapist' loophole, by ALESSANDRA MALDONADO

Jordan's cabinet has repealed a highly contentious clause that allowed rapists to escape persecution The Jordanian Parliament has voted to abolish a controversial law allowing rapists to evade punishment if they marry their victims, a decision that has bolstered the rights of women in a country that seems to remain wholly discriminatory against women.

This achievement is a result of the concerted effort of the civil society, women's rights and human rights organisations in Jordan," said Salma Nims, secretary-general of the Jordanian National Commission for Women.

Why Afghan women are campaigning for their names to be heard

In Afghan society it is the custom that women's names should not be uttered publicly. Afghan women are generally only referred to as the mother, daughter or sister of the eldest male in their family. Using the name of a woman is frowned upon and can even be considered an insult. According to a report by Thomson-Reuters,

Afghan law dictates that a mother's name should not be recorded on a birth certificate. A woman's identity is not even mentioned in their funeral, not written on their funeral cards and doesn't appear on their tombstones, they remain unidentified even after death.

But Afghan women's rights activists are seeking change by using social media with a campaign called #Where-IsMyName, which has been used over 1,000 times in the last few days.

Afghan men, who feel embarrassed to mention the name of their wives, have inherited this superstitious tradition from older generations. However, they do not know the reason. They only think it is the way because they have heard so from elders.

Hiding women's name has nothing to do with Islam. Had it been the case, why everyone knows the names of Islam's prophet's wives?

THE U.S. STATE DEPARTMENT SPONSORS A STEM PROGRAM FOR WOMEN

According to <u>The Hollywood Reporter</u>, the movie "Hidden Figures" is the first to ever inspire a publicly funded exchange program in the history of the U.S. State Department, which is sponsoring a STEM program. Called"HiddenNoMore," the program will reportedly bring 50 women working in math and science from 50 countries across Africa, Asia, Europe and Latin America to convene in the United States.

The State Department was inspired to launch the program after nearly 80 embassies across the world requested screenings of "Hidden Figures." #HiddenNoMore, which will be run through the department's **International Visitor Leadership Program**, will invite participants to spend three weeks discussing the importance of women in STEM at organizations across America.
