On October 14th, at the suggestion of AAUW member Suzanne Hagen, several members attended a play in St. Paul, "The Agitators - The Story of Susan B. Anthony and Frederick Douglass". In the director's notes, Signe Harriday said, "Their journey invites us to consider the moments in our lives when we have failed to stand up against the injustices perpetrated on our neighbors, on our fellow human beings. How can we fight for each other? How can we stay in the room with each other when we disagree, when we feel hurt and betrayed? How can we fight for each other's human dignity while not sacrificing our own? How can we fight for the right to vote when the very language of the law welcomes disenfranchisement? How can we be the **agitators** our world needs us to be?"

In light of recent events, words and deeds that divide, we each have to make a personal decision on the amount of effort we are going to give to the causes that make our world a better place for everyone. What will we stand for?

VOTE! VOTE! VOTE!

Know who you are voting for and why they are your favored candidate. You can obtain voting information (find your polling place, check your current registration information, learn what is on your ballot, and request and track your absentee ballot) at this site: https://myvote.wi.gov/en-us/

Talk to others, encourage them to vote, offer a ride. Go to a candidate's headquarters and offer to make GOTV calls. Do what you can to make this an election about issues, not money.

As concerned citizens, as women, as an important part of our nation's culture, AAUW members in River Falls and elsewhere need to talk to friends, neighbors and especially to their children and grandchildren about the importance of voting and partaking in our democracy. We need to express the issues that are important to our families and to our nation as a whole.

Those issues include:

- 1. Education funding for public schools.
- 2. Equal pay for equal work.
- 3. Civil rights for every man, woman and child.
- 4. Against sexual harassment and sexual assaults especially on our campuses and in the workplace.
- 5. For voting rights rather than placing obstacles to voting.

We have a right and an obligation to encourage others to vote. Make reminder calls, offer rides to the polls, talk about the candidates that truly represent our issues.

The election is Tuesday, November 6th, 2018.

LET CONGRESS KNOW

If you listen to the news regularly you know that political actions can change quite rapidly. Some think legislators pass bills quickly before the public gets wind of their actions. It's hard to know how to be heard in Washington and Madison. Let's try to make it easier for you to express your opinion prior to their voting on bills. AAUW has the perfect solution for you:

On your computer or cell phone, go on the internet to the website < aauw.org >

On that website Home page you will find "Issues" at the top of the page. Click on it. On my cell phone I needed to click on "Menu", then on "Issues". Each cell phone displays the pages a bit different so you may need to scan the page to advance to the Issues page.

On the Issues page you will see a list on the left side. Click on "Take Action".

The Take Action page rotates on five current actions that you can take. But first, let's get you signed up for notices. Scroll down to "Become a Two-Minute Activist". Enter your email address so AAUW can send you urgent notices of actions needed on legislation. Click on "Sign Up" following your email address entry.

Now you are on the **Two-Minute Activist** page and can fill in your information. I suggest you put a check next to "Washington Update Newsletter". It is a concise newsletter telling you federal policy news. Click on "Submit".

Now back up < one page to "Take Action". You can chose from the five actions currently. Health care is the urgent issue. You should "Take Action" and CALL SENATORS TOO!!

You may have noticed that AAUW is dealing with federal policies. There are often local policies that you may want to voice an opinion on. I suggest that you use the following websites to stay current on WI politics.

<u>madison.com</u> - articles from **The Cap Times** and **Wisconsin State Journal**<u>isonline.com</u> - articles from the **Milwaukee Journal Sentinel**wiseye.org - watch or listen to hearings, speeches, or news in review from around the state

I will also try to keep you informed. Please remember that timing is important so take action quickly so you are heard. Your involvement in political action is important!
