As we begin another year and welcome new members, it is uplifting to remember that we are more than a social group. Women have always wanted to make life better for those who come after us and AAUW has a rich history of doing that since the founding of the organization. AAUW-River Falls has been a long time asset to this community, the university and for each member. We have educated and advocated for some important issues and we can plan on doing that again this year.

We all know that there is an important election in 2020 and AAUW can have an impact educating the electorate and promoting voter turnout. For some of us living in the 7<sup>th</sup> Congressional District, an election may come sooner than expected. Today, August 26<sup>th</sup>, Rep. Sean Duffy announced that he is stepping down from his House seat to help with the care of their ninth child, due in October, who will be born with serious health problems. According to the *Wisconsin State Journal*, "Duffy's current term expires in 2021. Gov. Tony Evers must call a special election to fill the seat once Duffy resigns. The election must occur within 92 to 122 days of the governor's order for an election. Depending on when that call is made, a general election could occur on April 7, 2020, to coincide with the presidential preference primary and state Supreme Court election."

New Saudi Laws Allows Women to Travel without Male Consent Associated Press, Aug 1, 2019 by Aya Batraway

Saudi Women have been known to flee domestic abuse and the country's guardianship system" and seek asylum abroad. Saudi women fleeing domestic abuse and the guardianship system occasionally drew international attention to their plight, being dubbed "runaways" for escaping the kingdom and seeking asylum abroad. To leave the country they had to hack into their father's phones and change the settings on a government app to allow themselves permission to leave the country.

The new rule approved by King Salman and his Cabinet, allows any person 21 and older to travel abroad without prior consent and any citizen to apply for a Saudi passport on their own. It is not clear if the new rules go into effect immediately. Other changes issued in the decrees allow women to register a marriage, divorce or child's birth and to be issued official family documents.

The changes were widely celebrated by Saudis on Twitter, but also drew criticism from some conservatives.

Why Princess Märtha Louise of Norway is Ditching her Royal Title after 'Discussions with Family' by Erin Hill, 8/7/2019, Daly Mail

Princess Märtha Louise of Norway is making a big change when it comes to her official title. The royal has agreed to stop using the title of "Princess" in her business activities, the Norwegian Royal Household announced. Princess Märtha has been on tour with her American boyfriend, Shaman Durek (a.k.a. Derek Verrett), a "spiritual guide and gifted healer" to the stars who counts Gwyneth Paltrow among his celebrity clients. Their speaking tour was called "The Princess and the Shaman."

The 47-year-old royal, the mother of three daughters, Maud 16, Leah 12, Emma 10, divorced her husband, Ari Behn, in 2017. She is the eldest child of King Harald V and Queen Sonja. They shared the decision on Instagram, writing: "There have been many discussions about my use of title in a commercial context lately. The fact that I used Princess in the title of my tour, I have said before that I am very sorry, and I still stand by that. It was a mistake and I understand that it provokes when the princess title is used this way. "The discussions are something I have taken seriously, and in collaboration with my family we have found

We have therefore jointly come to the conclusion that I use the title princess when I represent the Royal House, do my official assignments at home and abroad and in private contexts. From now on I will not use my princess title in a commercial context. That is, in all commercial contexts, I only use Märtha Louise. "I find this to be a good solution where there is a clear distinction between my business activities and my role as representative of the Royal House, and that I have thus created room for greater freedom in my business activities."

China's Lone Sons Traffic in Brides, by Hannah Beech, New York Times (via Mpls. The Star/Tribune) China's "one-child" policy has been praised by its leaders for preventing the population from exploding into a Malthusian nightmare. But over 30 years, China was robbed of millions of girls as families used gender-based abortions and other methods to ensure their only child was a boy.

These boys are now men. At the height of the gender imbalance in 2004, 121 boys were born in China for every 100 girls, according to Chinese population figures.

To cope, Chinese men have begun importing wives, sometimes by force.

"Bride trafficking is very common here in Shan State" said Zaw Min Tun, a member of the police antihuman trafficking task force in Lashio." But only a few people are aware of the trafficking."

A Study by the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health and the Kachin Women's Association Thailand estimated that 21,000 women and girls from northern Myanmar were forced into marriage in just one province in China from 2003 to 2017.

# Ivanka Trump Plans Trip to Help Women. (Associated Press)

Ivanka Trump will travel to South America in September to focus on issues that make it difficult for women in developing countries to prosper financially. President Donald Trump's daughter plans to visit Paraguay and Argentina to promote the Woman's Global development and Prosperity Initiative, a program started six months ago, by focusing on three key areas: job training, financial assistance and encouraging legal and regulatory changes. During the trip, aides said, Ivanka Trump will advocate for laws and other institutions, build credit, own and inherit property, travel freely and work the same jobs as men.

Under Secretary of State for Political Affairs David Hale's Meeting with Sudanese Women and Youth Leaders, U.S. Department of State, Office of the Spokesperson, August 8, 2019

Under Secretary of State for Political Affairs David Hale met with Sudanese women and youth leaders on August 7th. The Under Secretary commended these individuals for their crucial and courageous role in moving Sudan towards a civilian-led transitional government and urged them to continue their persistent and peaceful engagement. The Under Secretary noted that women are integral to achieving peace and security in Sudan, and emphasized that inclusion in Sudan's civilian-led transitional government would help ensure that women's participation in Sudan's transition to democracy will be substantive and representative. He stated that America will work with Sudanese women in these efforts in line with America's strategy on Women, Peace, and Security. Under Secretary Hale also emphasized U.S. support for incorporating the strong voices of Sudan's youth in shaping Sudan's political future.

Contributing to this stark figure is the fact that less than one fifth of women give birth under the care of a skilled health professional. **Lithuania** was one of the first countries in the world to **grant women** a right to vote in the elections. **Lithuania women** were allowed to vote by the 1918 **Constitution** of **Lithuania** and used their newly granted right for the first time in 1919.

# Her Turn: The United Nations High Commission for refugees (UNHCR) report, reveals critical gap in education for refugee girls

"Her Turn", a report from UNHCR, the UN Refugee Agency, reveals that refugee girls at secondary level are only half as likely to enroll in school as their male peers, even though girls make up half of the schoolage refugee population.

Access to education is a fundamental human right. Yet, for millions of women and girls among the world's growing refugee population, education remains an aspiration, not a reality.

For all refugee children around the world, the school gates are a great deal harder to pry open than they are for their non-refugee peers. For refugee girls, it is even tougher to find – and keep – a place in the classroom. As they get older, refugee girls face more marginalization and the gender gap in secondary schools grows wider.

"It is time for the international community to recognize the injustice of denying refugee girls and women an education," said Filippo Grandi, UN High Commissioner for Refugees. "These findings are a global wake-up call, and I urge all to join us in demanding: 'It's her turn'."

UNHCR's report reveals that social and cultural conventions often result in boys being prioritized over girls to attend school. Poor facilities such as a lack of appropriate toilet facilities and menstrual supplies can block refugee girls' access to schools. Adding to the challenge, the cost of books, uniforms and the journey to school can be prohibitive for refugee families.

"Finding solutions to the challenges refugee girls face as they strive to go to school requires action right across the board – from national education ministries to teacher training institutions, in communities and classrooms," added Grandi. "There are formidable barriers to overcome. We are calling for an international effort to turn the tide."

To help more refugee girls get a quality education, UNHCR's report highlights a number of actions and policies that are both effective and deliverable.

There is also an urgent need to recruit and train more female teachers from within both host and refugee communities to ensure they promote best practice and guard against behavior that will deter girls from setting foot in the classroom.

The report notes that for refugee girls, a quality education is protective. It reduces vulnerability to exploitation, sexual and gender-based violence, teenage pregnancy and child marriage. Additionally, if all women received a primary level education, child deaths from diarrhea, malaria and pneumonia would fall.

Education is also empowering. The further girls progress with their schooling, the more they develop leadership skills, entrepreneurship, self-reliance and resilience. "If we continue to neglect refugee girls' education, it is evident that the consequences will be felt for generations," said Grandi. "It is time to make refugee girls' education a priority."

Only 61 per cent of refugee children have access to primary education, compared to an international average of 91 per cent. At secondary level, 23 per cent of refugee adolescents go to school, compared to 84 per cent globally.

If refugee adults are able to work and support their families, they are more likely to let their children stay in school. No girl should miss school because the journey to school is too far or too dangerous. Refugee girls need better protection from harassment, sexual assault and kidnap on the way to school.
