A Leadership Invitation. When I was a graduate student (<u>many</u> years ago), Marie, a friend and fellow student, was researching women's leadership and communication. She described our leadership style as "prepping a meal in a farm wife's kitchen." That phrase today is heavy with sexism and a narrow, stereotypical view of women farmers' work. However, the image is instructive: everyone steps up, pitches in, brings her resources (hot dish, then and now), serves a great meal and then tidies up the aftermath. This captures, I think, women's collegial, shared, participatory leadership approach in contrast to men's characteristically hierarchical, often top-down style.

Norway Sticks with Pro- oil Policies, by Mikael Foster, Bloomberg News, Dec.19, 2019

Norway has handed political control of its most important export to a former justice minister who's raised doubt about climate science and whose actions last year almost toppled the government.

The appointment of Sylvi Listhaug as petroleum and energy minister, overseeing the oil industry in Western Europe's biggest crude and gas-producing nation, means business as usual for the Conservative-led government's mostly pro-oil policies. It also highlights the country's contradictions as one of the world's biggest fossil-fuel exporters and a would-be leader in the fight against climate change. The 41-year-old, who until now was minister for the elderly and public health, replaced Kjell-Borge Freiberg, who took the position in mid-2018. Read below:

AGW member Prof. Cheryl Praeger wins Australian Prime Minister's Prize for Science

Mathematician Emeritus and member of **Australian Graduate Women Inc. (AGW)**, Professor Cheryl Praeger of the University of
Western Australia has received the 2019 Australian Prime Minister's
Prize for Science of \$250.000 for her contributions to pure mathematics. She studied at Oxford University, for which she had won a



scholarship, and in 1983, she became one of the first female professors of mathematics in Australia. This led her to partake in many different programmes and committees, such as the curriculum development council of the Australian government. Prof. Praeger's work spans decades and more than 400 journal publications. She sets a brilliant example of what

women can achieve in the fields of science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM).

GWI to host parallel event on women and corruption at CSW64 session

As a follow-up to the 9 December <u>press release</u> for Anti-Corruption Day, **Graduate Women International** announces to hold a parallel event during the 64th session of the Commission on the Status of Women (CSW64). The event will take place on 11 March, 2020, at 2.30 pm at the Church Center (10th Floor) across from the UN in New York. The parallel event is co-sponsored by the <u>Women's UN Report Network (WUNRN)</u> and <u>NGO Committee on the Status of Women, Geneva</u>. Seizing the CSW64 theme, this Women and Corruption parallel event is unique in that it will address corruption through a GENDER LENS. Women are targeted disproportionately as victims of corruption, and yet rarely in the discourse of corruption are women considered. Women experience corruption in specific ways, which greatly impact gender inequality. Panellists will assess the impact of gendered corruption, root causes and plausible recommendations. The parallel event will also examine how corruption impedes the implementation of the <u>12 Critical Areas of Concern</u> formulated within the <u>Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action</u> (1995).

The 75th session of CEDAW reviews Bulgaria, Pakistan and Zimbabwe

From 10-28 February 2020, the 75th session of the Committee on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women (CEDAW) will be held at the Palais des Nations in Geneva, Switzerland. CEDAW is the body of independent experts that monitors implementation of the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women. The CEDAW Committee consists of 23 experts on women's rights from around the world.

During this session, the Committee will review and address concerns and

recommendations, among others, regarding the submission of the CEDAW reports by GWI affiliates in Bulgaria, Pakistan and Zimbabwe

22 Men own more wealth than Africa's 326 Women, Oxfam says, by Charles Riley, CNN Business, January 20, 2020

Global inequality is "out of control" because of biased economic systems that exclude many women while allowing billionaires to amass huge fortunes that do little for society, according to Oxfam International. The charity is calling on governments to implement policies that ease the burden on women who provide care for children and the elderly, often for little or no pay. Oxfam suggests higher taxes on the wealthy, and more spending by national governments on child-and health care.

Oxfam's annual report on inequality was released ahead of the World Economic Forum in Davos, Switzerland, which each year brings together many of the world's most influential people. Read below:
